1. PURPOSE. This MOI assigns responsibilities and procedures for selecting the Adjutant General's Corps Regimental Officer, Warrant Officer (WO), Noncommissioned Officer (NCO), Soldier, and Civilian of the Year for calendar year 2013-2014 (includes dates of 31 May 2013 through 30 May 2014).

2. APPLICABILITY.

a. Officers. All Adjutant General's Corps Officers (42B, 42C), 2LT through CPT (CPT nonpromotable as of 1 February 2014) are eligible for this award.

b. Warrant Officers. All Adjutant General's Corps Warrant Officers (420A, 420C), WO1 through CW3 (CW3 nonpromotable as of 1 February 2014) are eligible for this award.

c. Noncommissioned Officers. All Career Management Field 42 (Bandsmen included) and MOSs 79R, 79S, 79T NCOs, SGT through SFC (SFC nonpromotable as of 1 February 2014) are eligible for this award.

d. Soldiers. All Career Management Field (CMF) 42 (Bandsmen included) and MOSs 79R, 79S, 79T, PVT through SPC / CPL promotable are eligible for this award.

e. Civilians. Civilian Employees (GS, or NF, in career field CP50, and those in CP32 who directly work developing or delivering HR institutional training), working for the Department of Defense (e.g., MEPCOM), or the Department of the Army, in, or in support of, the field of Human Resources Management. This year we are expanding the recognition of our Civilian workforce. Civilian Employees will now compete in two distinct categories and the Adjutant General's Corps will award two Dinnien awards in the categories below:

(1) The first category is the AG Civilian Employee of the Year and will include the grade levels of GS-01 through GS-09 or NF-1 through NF-3.

(2) The second category is the AG Senior Civilian Employee of the Year and will include the grade levels of GS-10 through GS-15 or NF-4 through NF-6.

f. All Soldier and Civilian Regimental award nominees must be either on Active Duty, in a Reserve Status, or employed by the Federal Government as of 30 June 2014.

g. Officers, WOs, NCOs, Soldiers, Civilians from military foreign exchange programs, other branches of service other than Army, or from other branches other than AG within the Army are ineligible for recognition of this award.

3. RESPONSIBILITIES.

a. The Office of the Chief of the Adjutant General's Corps (AGC), Fort Jackson, SC, administers the AGC Regimental Awards Program.

d. To encourage greater competition from the US Army Reserve, at least three nominations each for Officer, WO, NCO, Soldier, and Civilian and Senior Civilian of the Year are requested from the US Army Reserve Command & Chief, US Army Reserve Office. The Chief, US Army Reserve Office will make the final determination for the three USAR nominations per category.

e. To encourage greater competition from the Army National Guard, at least three nominations each for Officer, WO, NCO, Soldier, Civilian and Senior Civilian of the Year are requested which represent the 54 state and territory ARNG Headquarters. The Army National Guard Bureau will make the final determination for the three ARNG nominations per category.

4. Selection Boards.

a. The selection board for the Adjutant General's Corps Regimental Officer of the Year will consist of the following members:

- (1) Chief of the Corps (President).
- (2) Chief, Training Division, Adjutant General School.
- (3) Other active duty or retired Adjutant General's Corps Officers as designated by the Board President.

b. The selection board for the Adjutant General's Corps Regimental Warrant Officer of the Year will consist of the following members:

- (1) Regimental Chief Warrant Officer (President).
- (2) Army Band Proponent Warrant Officer, Adjutant General School.
- (3) Other active duty or retired AGC Warrant Officers as designated by the Board President.

c. The selection board for the Adjutant General's Corps NCO and Soldier of the Year will consist of the following members:

5. Procedures.

a. Each ACOM or organization listed in paragraph 3c is requested to submit one Regimental award nomination packet per category. USARC and Army National Guard Bureau are requested to submit at least three nomination packets per category.

b. Regimental award requirements and nomination packet criteria is provided as Enclosures 1 through 3.

c. Request all ACOMs and organizations submit their respective Regimental award nomination packets NLT 1 February 2014 to the address below. Electronic scanning and e-mail is preferred. Please ensure nomination packets are clearly scanned for Board consideration.

(2) Nomination packets will include an endorsement from the recommended nominee's supporting senior AG / HR Officer on post, or at higher HQs.

Individuals selected as Regimental award winners should be available for TDY to Fort Jackson / Columbia, SC, to attend the Regimental award presentation ceremony during the National Adjutant General's Corps Regimental Ball scheduled for 30 May 2014. TDY funding for travel, food and lodging must be arranged by the Regimental award winner's command or home station.

 - Due to support of deployed operations, some Officers / Warrant Officers may not have taken the APFT or qualified with an assigned weapon within 12 months of board packet submission date. Submit a Company Commander's memorandum explaining these circumstances and provide date and score of the last test and qualification within the preceding 12 months.
 - Award nominees will receive the minimum Board points available for Weapons Qualification scorecard that is incomplete or submitted by a Company Commander with an exception explanation.
- ✓ APFT for Combat Wounded Soldiers or Soldiers with profiles:
 - Combat Wounded Soldiers or Soldiers with profiles with an APFT scorecard within the last 12 months and with less than three scoring events, will take the average of the other one or two events and add the average to determine an overall APFT score (per the Semi-Centralized Promotion process).
 - Example - if the profiled Soldier can only take one APFT and scores 80 points, then the one event score is added two more times to determine an overall APFT score of 240 points; same for only two APFT events being averaged, 100 & 70 points averages to 85 = an overall APFT score of 255.
 - Profiled Soldiers unable to take an APFT within 12 months of Board packet submission can submit the most recent record APFT taken by the Soldier within the preceding 12 months.
 - A Company Commander's statement validating APFT scores for Combat Wounded Soldiers or Soldiers with profiles is required.

**CRITERIA AND NOMINATING PROCEDURES FOR THE "JOHN J. DINNIEN CIVILIAN
AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN MILITARY PERSONNEL MANAGEMENT"**

1. **Purpose.** The purpose of this award is to give special recognition to DoD or DA Civilian Employees who work in or support Human Resources (HR) management (military) for contributions of outstanding significance to the Army, AG Corps and service to Soldiers during the previous calendar year.
2. **General.** The "John J. Dinnien Civilian Award for Excellence in support of Military Personnel Management" was created to annually recognize the contributions of Army Civilian Employees in military personnel management. The award is named in honor of Mr. John J. Dinnien, who epitomized the best qualities of a professional HR manager, and always placed service to the Army and Soldier above all else.
3. **Eligibility.** Eligible personnel include: Civilian Employees (GS, or NF, primarily in career field CP50, and those in CP32 who directly work developing or delivering HR institutional training), working for the Department of Defense (e.g., MEPCOM), or the Department of the Army, in, or in support of, the field of Human Resources Management.
4. **Dinnien Award Categories.** This year Civilian Employees will compete in two distinct categories and the Adjutant General's Corps will award two Dinnien awards as provided below:
 - a. The first category is the AG Civilian Employee of the Year and will include the grade levels of GS-01 through GS-09, or NF-1 through NF-3.
 - b. The second category is the AG Senior Civilian Employee of the Year and will include the grade levels of GS-10 through GS-15, or NF-4 through NF-6.
 - c. Additional Civilian Employee criteria follows:
 - (1) If the nominee is a "retired military" AG Civilian Employee, the nominee must have a minimum of 10 years DoD and/or DA Civilian Employee service.
 - (2) If the nominee is "not" retired military, no minimum Civilian Employee service is required for career Civilian Employees, or Veteran Civilian Employees.

5. Basis for Selection. Completion of an Army HR task or assignment which has significantly contributed to the execution of the Army's mission, while honoring all traditional American military values, placing special emphasis on: loyalty, duty, respect, selfless service, honor, integrity, and personal courage. The following evaluation criteria should be used in selecting award nominees:

a. Civilian Employees assigned duties of major significance to the military HR or personnel mission, which were accomplished in such a way as to have been clearly exceptional.

b. Civilian Employees who developed or improved military HR or personnel methods and procedures, or were responsible for exceptional achievements that caused significant savings or advanced the military HR / personnel mission, or personnel readiness.

c. Civilian Employees who provided outstanding examples for major military HR / personnel programs in terms of highly successful mission accomplishment.

d. Civilian Employees who demonstrated a record of achievement and inspired others to improve the quantity and quality of their work.

e. Civilian Employees who have an established a pattern of excellence, as recognized by previous accomplishments (i.e., Commander's Award for Civilian Service, multiple Exceptional Performance Appraisals, etc.).

f. Award nominees cannot have any current disciplinary actions, adverse counselings, or letters of reprimand. The nominee's CP50 Program Manager or Commander will provide a statement verification stating there are no current or adverse actions against the nominee.

g. Each award nominee must be employed by the Federal Government through 30 June 2014.

6. Nomination of Candidates. Each Civilian Employee nomination packet will include the following:

a. 8x10 head / shoulder photo (JPG file).

b. Recommendation memo from the nominee's chain of command (requires a minimum of LTC Commander endorsement).

c. Include an endorsement from the recommended nominee's supporting senior AG / HR officer on post, or higher HQs (*Narrative – not more than 2 pages, Arial, font size 12*).

d. Nomination format – Recommending official will provide one sheet of plain bond paper containing the following information:

(1) Name and duty title of nominee.

(2) A brief description of the nominee's duty description and responsibilities, including the scope of their work.

(3) Narrative. Double-spaced, Arial 12 font, on plain bond paper, not more than two pages. Accomplishments should be as specific as possible, unclassified information only. Recommending official should emphasize the following: nominee's support to the Army and / or AG Corps; impact to supporting Commanders, Soldiers, Families and the unit / organization; and contributions toward exemplary mission accomplishment.

e. There is no specific format for the nomination packet narrative and no examples will be provided to preclude favoritism.

6. Procedures.

a. ACOMs or organizations submitting nominees for the "John J. Dinnien Civilian Award for Excellence in Support of Military Personnel Management" should have nomination packets screened by their respective CP50 Program Manager.

b. The nominating ACOM / organization is responsible for the award recipient's TDY expenses for their attendance at the formal presentation ceremony on 30 May 2014 at the National Adjutant General's Corps Regimental Ball at Fort Jackson / Columbia, SC.

c. The award recipient's names will be added to the John J. Dinnien Award plaque hanging in the Adjutant General School Hall of Honor. The recipient will also receive a one (1) year membership to the Adjutant General's Corps Regimental Association (AGCRA).

7. Synopsis of Mr. John J. Dinnien's Biography:

a. Mr. John J. Dinnien dedicated over 50 years of his life in service to his country. Mr. Dinnien began his civil service career in 1945 with the US Army Europe Adjutant General's Office, immediately following his military service during WWII. He served in Europe until 1979, when he returned to the United States for what would be his last assignment as the 1st Personnel Command Liaison Officer to the US Army Military Personnel Center, Alexandria, Virginia.

b. Mr. Dinnien was the ultimate advocate for Soldiers, and always placed their needs above his own. Mr. Dinnien received numerous awards during his career, culminating with the Decoration for Exceptional Civilian Service, the Army's highest civilian service award.
